Definitions:

College — The physical site located on South Road, outlying buildings, grounds and shared communal spaces, and all members of the College, both students and staff.

College Officer — The College Officers are the Principal, Vice-Principal and Assistant Principal.

Members — Undergraduates and Postgraduates who are members of the College.

Resident — A student Member living in College accommodation.

UNIVERSITY REGULATIONS & MATRICULATION

Matriculation is a ceremony held in Durham Cathedral to admit new members of the University. At the Matriculation Ceremony, one undergraduate Member of the College and one postgraduate Member of the College sign the Matriculation Book on behalf of all new Members entering the College and University. By this act, and by registering with the University, each Member makes the following declaration:

I agree to be bound by all University Statutes, Regulations and Rules (available at <u>Governance</u> <u>Documentation - Durham University</u>), as amended by the University from time to time. This includes the <u>Student Pledge - Durham University</u>.

- Before Matriculation, all Members are required to complete the MANDATORY Consent Matters: Boundaries, Respect and Positive Intervention module on Blackboard, see link here —
 EDI hub Home
- The University's Statutes, Regulations, and Rules are set out in General Regulation IV
 (Governance Durham University). The University's Policies may be found on the Policy Zone
 SharePoint and the Student Support and Wellbeing SharePoint.
- The Principal of the College (or her delegate) is an Authorised University Officer (AUO) and will
 investigate reported breaches of University policies under the University's Discipline Regulations (Non-Academic Misconduct and Discipline Durham University)

UNIVERSITY ON-LINE ENROLMENT & REGISTRATION TASKS TO DO

To become a fully registered Durham student, you'll need to complete our Enrolment and Registration process. There are three elements to Enrolment and Registration:

- 1 Enrol with the University: as soon as you receive the username and password for your IT account, log into Banner Self Service and complete Enrolment. Read more about Enrolment in our Enrolling with the University section.
- **Select your optional modules:** after the 1st of September, and once you've read the information from your Department in the Learn Ultra Induction site, you can select your optional modules. You can read more about Module Selection in our <u>Selecting for Optional Modules</u> section.
- **Verify your identity:** once you've arrived in Durham, you'll need to take your ID to your College. You can read more about Verification in our <u>Verifying your Identity</u> section.

Please update or confirm your personal information and accept the University's regulations above. It's really important that you complete this before arriving in Durham (in particular your personal details and tuition fee information) otherwise it may delay getting your campus card etc. **ALL information can be found at this link** Checklist for New Students - Durham University.

ARRIVAL AT GREY COLLEGE

The University Welcome and Orientation period for new students (known as Freshers' Week) starts on Saturday 27th September 2025 for a week, welcome activities will start early evening of Saturday 27th September at College (main site on South road) for all our new UG students. Please see below for arrival dates to Grey College.

Students who are UK residents and living in College

Students coming from within the UK who are living in College accommodation are asked to come into residence on **Saturday 27th September.**

- Anyone travelling by public transport is asked to notify us of their approximate arrival time when completing the online College Registration form, this will be shared via email week beginning 25th August.
- Anyone travelling by car will need to arrive in one of our designated arrival slots. This will allow us to manage the traffic and control the number of students arriving at any one time. Sign-up for arrival slots will be circulated at the start of September, and these run from 9 am— 4 pm.

Students who are not UK residents

Licence Agreements commence on Wednesday 24th September for students travelling from overseas and if living in College, the first meal provided is on the evening of that day. An additional charge is payable to cover room and catering for this period and will be detailed in your Licence Agreement.

Students coming from outside the UK are asked to indicate their planned arrival day and time to the College on the registration form to help our planning, and make sure we are able to welcome you.

• Students coming from overseas may wish to use the **University's free Meet and Greet** (welcome) Service available on the 24th and 25th September for those who arrive at Newcastle Airport, details of which can be found at www.durham.ac.uk/study/international/arrivals/

WHAT HAPPENS ON ARRIVALS DAY?

When you arrive our Fresher Representatives (FReps) team will welcome you and show you to your room. Our FReps can help you to unload your luggage. For those travelling by car, once your vehicle is unloaded you will need to move it to make space for the next group of arrivals - we can direct you to a nearby car park (there is no parking charge for this).

For students from overseas who arrive outside core hours, one of our friendly staff will be on hand to welcome you and show you to your room and provide further information on what to do the following day.

VERIFICATION OF IDENTITY

This is completed at College on arrivals day or at our 'Registration & Verification' events. More details will be in college emails. Don't forget to bring your Passport or Photo Driving License with you to Durham for verification so you will then be able to collect your campus card.

EARLY ARRIVALS

Any student who wishes to arrive at Grey College earlier than the commencement of their Licence Agreement should email grey.admissions@durham.ac.uk to check availability, to book and pay.

COLLEGE PRE-ARRIVAL TASKS

The tasks below can all be completed online. Relevant links to some of them will be circulated in further communications over the coming weeks.

1) COMPLETE COLLEGE REGISTRATION FORM (Deadline 09:00 BST on Wednesday 17th September). This will be emailed to you and covers the following:

- Arrival information Method of transport (UK students) and date/time of arrival (Students coming from overseas only);
- Dietary Requirements for welcome formals & freshers events
- Consents for contact details to be passed to official photographers for matriculation photographs and Junior Common room for their communications to new students.

2) JUNIOR COMMON ROOM (JCR) WELCOME LETTER

Please read the letter from our Junior Common Room (JCR) President Freddie Bloom <u>JCR-President-Welcome-Letter.pdf</u> which explains what a junior common room and further information can be found at <u>Grey JCR</u>. To enable the Junior Common Room to help plan some of their welcome activities its important you give consent on our college registration form for College to share your contact details.

3) COLLEGE SOCIAL CODE

This has been developed by the College and JCR (our student body) in partnership to ensure that the social life of College, clubs, societies and committees adds to the wider College Community. This will be emailed to you and should be **completed by ALL new students by 27th September 2025.**

4) PAYMENT OF OPTIONAL CHARGES

There are a variety of optional fees that students can opt to pay from early September e.g. welcome week wristband, gowns. Some of these should be paid in advance of arrival by accessing the appropriate web link from our arrival information. Further details about these charges can be found on **page 16** of this booklet.

5) MEDICAL REGISTRATION AND VACCINATIONS

Its important that all students coming to Durham register so that they are able to access health care in Durham when they need it, and is especially important if you have an ongoing health condition. More information can be found at <u>Medical Registration and Advice</u>. Most students choose the <u>Claypath and University Medical Group</u>. Pre-registration is by an online process, which can be done before you arrive in Durham. Pre-registration is available here, <u>Student Pre-Registration</u>

As part of the registration, you will be asked whether you have an NHS number or not. You will only have a number if you have previously registered with a doctor in the UK, but you can still complete this online registration if you are an overseas student and don't already have an NHS number. All students are advised to check required vaccinations are up to date— Vaccinations - Durham University

6) STUDENT COMMUNITY INDUCTION

At Durham, we are committed to creating a welcoming, respectful, and inclusive community where every individual feels valued and supported.

We've built a package of training and resources for our students to help us achieve this. This package is called the **Student Community Induction** and includes:

- CONSENT MATTERS COURSE This course is COMPULSORY for all new starters, including UG, PGT and PGR students. All new students will be automatically assigned to the course which includes 3 modules and 1 quiz.
- RESPECT, VALUES AND BEHAVIOURS COURSE has been developed for staff and students to provide the knowledge and skills to create a respectful environment across the university community. In line with the University@Values@and recommendations from the Respect Commission Report, the programme aims to support staff and students to work towards the University's Respect Project vision of "creating a respectful environment where everyone can flourish and feel that they are valued and a respected member of our University community". This work is a fundamental building block to help create an inclusive culture at Durham.

Before the conclusion of Welcome and Orientation Week, all new students are therefore required to complete the online course, 'Consent Matters; Boundaries, Respect and Positive Intervention', which is available on Blackboard before participation in College-based clubs, societies or committees, or activities with Experience Durham. You will also receive an email with a link to the course.

During the College Registration Day, staff at Grey College will require you to confirm that you have, or will, complete the MANDATORY Consent Matters course by Tuesday 30th September 2025. This needs to be done before Matriculation on the 1st October 2025. We hope that all students will find the course interesting and commit to maintaining our valued culture of respect at Durham University. For more information, visit EDI hub - Home



7) POLICE, FIRE AND HEALTH & SAFETY

All students will need to be aware of Police and Fire Safety, and complete our Health and Safety modules prior to arrival.

Fire Safety: Being aware of fire safety advice is extremely important. All students are asked to watch this <u>video</u> in advance of their arrival at Durham.

- **Police Liaison:** The University enjoys a positive working relationship with Durham Constabulary, including making sure all new students have the best and safest experience possible in the City. All new students should access information & watch a video by PC Gary Thompson, our Police Liaison Officer here.
- Health and Safety for Students: There are a number of things all our students should be aware of before arriving in Durham. Further information will be circulated in September and can be accessed here.

GREY COLLEGE ACCOMODATION

Grey College is a fully catered college providing three meals per day during the periods of undergraduate terms. Grey students who live out of college can still purchase meals and eat in the dining hall. We mostly have fresher rooms (catered), limited number of self-catered rooms for returning students/postgrads on College site, and self-catered rooms at Ernest Place for postgrads. Some freshers may choose to live in private accommodation or at home. Remember, it doesn't matter where you live—we are all members of Grey College!



ACCOMODATION AT GREY COLLEGE

Most Freshers at Grey live in standard rooms having what we term 'shared' bathroom facilities. Each corridor, or section of a block, has a number of private shower cubicles and toilets. Grey has limited en-suite rooms available for Freshers, but these are allocated to students having specific medical conditions in the first instance.

We do have thirteen shared rooms, so some freshers at Grey College may have to share a twin room. Students are normally only exempt from sharing if they are able to provide evidence of a medical condition which would require a single room.

LET LENGTHS AND RESIDENCE CHARGES

We have some rooms on different lets as indicated in the University residence charges here.

A student who requires an en-suite room on medical grounds can find more information and the criteria here— Ensuite Accommodation on Medical Grounds - Durham University

We have some bedrooms with 3/4 size beds, which do have an additional charge.

Students who are on a Shorter Let and wish to remain in residence during the some vacations may be required to move to an alternative room or to another College during this period.

SECURING ACCOMODATION

Students who have met the Accommodation Guarantees from the University will receive a Licence Agreement and 'Particulars of Offer' letter via email within a week of receiving their confirmed allocation to Grey College. This must be agreed and the advanced rent paid within 5 (five) days of receiving your offer. **Your accommodation is not guaranteed until this is done.** Please note this is non-refundable!

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Important financial information, including details of costs and financial support options, can be found at this <u>webpage</u>.

TUITION FEES

Students confirm how these are being paid as part of the online registration process.

YOUR MAINTENANCE LOAN

The university cannot confirm your registration to Student Finance England (or equivalent) until you have completed the University enrolment process, including verification of identity. It takes 2 - 4 working days from confirmation of enrolment to your payment being received.

RESIDENCE INVOICES AND OTHER COLLEGE CHARGES

All sums due to the College, are assembled on a single invoice which will be e-mailed to your Durham e-mail account. The advanced rent payment for accommodation will be taken off the total costs.

Payment is then requested in three equal instalments over the course of the year. Most students opt to set-up a Direct Debit to pay this invoice, which is the University's preferred method of payment. In this case, payments are taken on 1st December, 1st February and 1st June. If you don't set-up a Direct Debit you are responsible for paying the fees on time, on the dates given on your invoice (before the Direct Debit dates).

The residence charge itself will depend on the type of room allocated. In addition, the international early arrival charge will also be added where applicable. It is anticipated that the invoice will be raised and emailed to your Durham email address early in the academic year.

DURHAM UNDERGRADUATE BURSARY (FORMERLY THE DURHAM GRANT SCHEME)

For students in receipt of the Durham Grant, this will be paid into your bank account even if you are living in College accommodation. We strongly recommend that you use your Durham Grant to pay your College accommodation. You will not be paid unless you provide the University with your bank sort code and account number.

Shortly after you are informed about your Durham Grant, the Student Financial Support Office will send you an e-mail telling you how to do this.

You will only receive your payments if you are a fully registered student of Durham University on the payment date. You will stop being a fully registered student if you suspend your studies or if you withdraw from your studies.

OTHER FEES (NOT PART OF RESIDENCE INVOICE)

There are a variety of optional fees that students can either opt-into or opt-out of paying. These can be paid in advance of arrival by accessing the appropriate web link from the college emails available early September when further information is circulated. These will be payable via the University e-commerce system, which is also used for payment at attendance at events through the year, and should be signed-up to using your Durham email address.

STUDENT COMMON ROOM CHARGE (£195 for 3 years inc. VAT)

The University and College assume that the majority of our students wish to fully participate in the life of the JCR, to benefit from what it has to offer. Students are strongly encouraged to pay for their

JCR membership in advance of arrival at Durham via the online platform, details of which will be circulated to students in College emails. Make sure to follow @grey_sabbs on Instagram for the latest news!

Grey College JCR is run by students, for students. The JCR provide extracurricular opportunities for students throughout their time here, running large-scale events, organising sports teams and societies, encouraging student development and providing support services to students. On joining the JCR, you'll be part of a community of over 1200 students.

JCR Member Benefits:

- 1) Participation in over 50 different JCR-run sports, societies and committees (apart from our Rowing Club)
- 2) Discounted prices and early-access booking for events across the year, including Winter and Summer Balls
- 3) Free ticket each year to Grey Day
- 4) Discounted price for access to our on-site Gym
- 5) Access to JCR Sports, Music and Tech equipment
- 6) Can run for JCR positions and vote in JCR meetings
- 7) Represent the JCR in unelected committees and help with event planning, charity fundraising, welfare campaigns, managing our finances and much more!
- 8) Access to the JCR Room, equipped with a free-to-play Pool Table and Table Tennis Table Grey College JCR is an independent charity that operates entirely in support of their members' social, sporting and wellbeing whilst they study here at Durham don't miss out!

We offer the JCR Membership Fee to you, encompassing your full time here at Durham, at a cost of £195 for students starting a 3-year course and £235 for a 4-year course.

If you're thinking about not joining the JCR we would encourage you to first contact Freddie, our JCR President grey.president@durham.ac.uk to make sure that it is the right decision for you.

WELCOME WEEK CHARGE (£26 inc. VAT)

Grey College Junior Common Room (JCR) organises a variety of events during the Welcome and Orientation Period. These are designed to help all our new students get to know each other and settle

into College life including social events, talks, tours and society fairs. The cost of participating is £26 and includes a T-shirt. Welcome week must be paid for via the payment platform that will be circulated to students early September in advance of participation and refunds are not possible past arrival at Grey College. Students are therefore encouraged to access the payment system when it becomes available in advance of their arrival to save issues at the Grey College Registration.

Grey College will cover the Welcome Week Charge for students who are eligible for a "Grey College Bursary." These students will still need to sign-up for the Welcome Week prior to arrival, but will be provided with information on how to indicate they are recipient of this Bursary when the payment link is circulated in early September. Details of those eligible for the Bursary will be made available

at the same time.

GOWN (£50)

The wearing of a gown is compulsory at Grey College when attending Matriculation and Formal Meals during term time. Gown purchase is optional during the College registration process, when



able to collect, sign and pay, via debit or credit card, for a gown.

We have a limited supply of second hand (laundered) gowns, available priced at £25. If you would like to be considered for a second hand gown, please email grey.admissions@durham.ac.uk with your height, and we will check availability, on a first come first served basis.

Grey College will be covering the Gown Charge for students who are eligible for a "Grey College Bursary." At the gown collection during College Registration, the person taking payment will know this. Details of those eligible for the Bursary will be made available with information on the JCR and Welcome Week Charges through college emails.

LINEN PACKS (OVERSEAS/ISLANDS STUDENTS ONLY)

Students arriving from Overseas and the Islands, who are resident in the College can order and pay for a Linen Pack including duvet and cover, pillow and pillow case and one sheet (singles cost £35, doubles cost £53) and payment made in advance of their arrival. These will be in your room ready for your arrival. Payment should be made via a link which will be circulated early September in College emails.

WELCOME WEEK ACTIVITIES

There will be a whole range of activities to undertake during Welcome and Orientation (Freshers)

Week to welcome you to Durham. These will include events run by both Grey College, Grey Junior Common Room (JCR) and your Department. In college, the following (and more) activities will be undertaken:

- Welcome events and ice-breakers;
- Identity verification, Campus Card collection and gown collection;
- Mandatory College Talks on Wider Student Collegiate Life, Consent and Community;
- Health and Safety talks;
- Matriculation, the official welcome to the University;
- Social activities.
- Freshers Fair

LETTER REQUESTS

International students occasionally require letters of introduction. If you require either of these we will provide details with how they can be requested in September.

RIGHT TO STUDY CHECK

If you're not British or Irish (or from the Channel Islands or Isle of Man), you're required to complete a Right to Study Check before starting your course and after any changes to your permission to live in the UK and study at Durham. The check is required by the UK Government and is part of your University registration process. If you don't complete it, you won't be registered on your course, and you'll lose access to IT and other facilities.

The Student Immigration Service will contact you if you're required to complete a Right to Study check. If you need more information, please visit the <u>student immigration service website</u> and you can also seek advice via email: <u>immigration@durham.ac.uk</u>

NON-ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT & DISCIPLINE

In accepting an offer of a place at the University students agree to be bound by the University's regulations, which include Section IV Displine. Students are expected to adhere to the University's regulations on conduct; failure to do so can result in disciplinary action.

Students are expected to treat all members of the community with respect including their peers, staff, and visitors to the University and members of the local community, as outlined in the Student Pledge. Students are also expected to behave in a way that does not interfere with or cause disrup-

tion to the normal operations of the University and community. Where there is reason to believe that rules and regulations have been broken, and/or when the behaviour of a student falls below the expected standards, these Disciplinary Procedures will be used.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION FOR RESIDENT STUDENTS

BICYCLES

Students who bring bicycles to Durham should ensure that they are stored in the College bicycle shed. You will need to pay a £30 deposit for a bike shed key to the JCR upon your arrival at Grey College. Your deposit will be returned at the end of the year when you return the key.

Bicycles should not be taken inside University buildings, including student bedrooms. Students who are found to have brought a cycle into their bedroom will be sanctioned. Considerable damage has been caused to College property in previous years by cycles being brought into buildings.

Students are advised to ensure that appropriate insurance is taken out against loss or theft of cycles.

CATERING

College provides three meals a day, seven days per week during periods of Undergraduate Term. All dietary requirements can be catered for, please indicate these in our College Registration Form. If your dietary requirements are complex and you need to discuss them further, please contact Food and Beverage Manager, Nicola Gittins, after arrival.

ENIVRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

As a member of Grey College and Durham University you are part of a community which is proud to be committed to environmental sustainability. Greenspace is the name for Durham University's environment team. The team coordinates environmental initiatives across the University focusing on: energy, including the carbon management plan; waste; water; travel; and biodiversity

INSURANCE COVER FOR STUDENTS

Basic contents insurance cover for items in your room is included as standard for student residents in all University accommodation by partnering with Endsleigh, the No.1 student insurance provider. Further information will be circulated in September ahead of arrival telling you how to register with My Endsleigh.

It's easy to underestimate the value of your possessions, and we're not just talking about your laptop and phone. Items such as your clothes, hairdryers and other smaller gadgets, like Fitbits and watches can all add up.

LAUNDRY

Our washing and drying facilities are all card operated. The majority of our washing machines come pre-loaded with detergent and conditioner, but there are a few machines that will let you use your

own detergent.

A wash costs from £4.90; tumble driers are free of charge. You must not dry laundry in your bedroom as this will cause mould. All laundry rooms have clotheshorses to dry items that cannot be tumble dried—as such, please do not bring your own clotheshorse to College.

To use the washing machines in College you will need to download the *Circuit Plus App* and set-up an account. More details on this will be in your arrival pack.

LINEN

All mainland UK-based students must bring their own bed linen (sheets, duvet, duvet cover, pillow, and pillow case). We'd recommend bringing a double flat sheet and double duvet as these can be folded to any size bed.

Overseas students (including students from Ireland/Channel Islands) can order and pay for a linen pack if desired as described earlier. Linen Packs which have been purchased will be ready in student bedrooms upon arrival and include: 1 Duvet, 1 Duvet Cover, 1 Pillow, 1 Pillowcase and 1 Sheet.

TV LICENSE

There's nothing like that last minute goal, the nail-biting season finale or your favourite Friday night sitcom to bring students together, laughing, crying and cheering over a laptop in College.

If you plan on watching live TV, watching or streaming programmes live on an online TV service, or downloading, using BBC iPlayer, you will need a TV Licence. The College's license won't cover you and you may not be covered by your parents' license. You can check your eligibility and purchase a licence if needed online.

PORTABLE ELECTRICAL EQUIPMENT

The University has a legal duty to ensure that all electrical equipment used on its premises are safe. You will be sent a list of prohibited items later in the summer—please do not bring any of these items to College with you. For certain other items, Portable Appliance Testing (PAT) will be available in the College during Welcome Week. Some items are only allowed in the kitchenettes in each block.

There are some simple precautions you can take to prevent danger from portable electrical equipment in low-risk environments, such as University residential accommodation.

Extension leads and Bar Adaptors

- To avoid overloading sockets and risk of fire, please check the current rating of the extension lead before plugging appliances into it. Most are rated at 13 A, but some are rated at only 10 A or less the rating should be clearly marked on the back or underside of the extension lead. If not, refer to the manufacturer's instructions. Never overload an extension lead by plugging in appliances that together will exceed the maximum current rating stated for the extension lead. This could cause the plug in the wall socket to overheat and possibly cause a fire.
- Only use one socket extension lead per socket and never plug an extension lead into another extension lead.

Use a multi-way bar extension lead rather than a block adaptor as this will put less strain on the
wall socket. Some block adaptors do not have a fuse, which increases the risk of overloading
and fire. The use of block adaptors which do not incorporate a fuse is not permitted in University
premises.

Using electrical products from other Countries

Using international appliances in UK sockets is dangerous if their plugs have not been converted for UK use, and it could result in a fire or electric shock. Travel adaptors are not appropriate long-term solutions as they are not a suitable nor safe alternative for continuous use.

Do not put yourself or others at risk by using international plugs in UK sockets!!

You can use a conversion plug to improve the safety of your international appliances. Please note that travel adaptors are not the same as conversion plugs. Conversion plugs have several benefits:

- They can be fitted easily, quickly and safely;
- They will make the electrical appliance safe for UK sockets;
- They will reduce the risk of fire;
- They will reduce the risk of electric shock.

We recommend you replace the appliance with a UK standard electrical product if the plug is not suitable for conversion.

List of Prohibited Items in study bedrooms, pantries and kitchens

To keep everyone safe, Durham University has identified that certain items are prohibited in bedrooms, pantries and kitchens. College officer may remove other items not on the list if they are considered to be a danger, if in doubt please contact the College Operations manager, Jo Bell, Please read the list before arriving in college using this link— College prohibited items kitchens and bedrooms v5.pdf

Fire Safety

If fire alarm rings continually you must evacuate the building as quickly as possible using the nearest fire exit, if on site in College the fire assembly point is at car park in front of Fountains Hall. Please do not try to re-enter any building until told by staff its safe to do so, this is for your own safety and the safety of others.

Tampering with fire alarms is a disciplinary offence and will not be tolerated.

TRANSPORT AND MOTOR VEHICLES

Durham University is doing all it can to reduce the need to use private cars, making the best use of existing facilities, managing travel demands and promoting the use of more sustainable modes of transport. So, unless you meet the needs-based parking criteria or you are a blue badge holder, it's best to leave your car at home. There are loads of great alternatives like buses, bikes and taxis for getting around. Students can travel on Arriva bus services at discounted rates. Check out the Greenspace webpages for details.
