I am consistently inspired by the unwavering passion and dedication our students exhibit towards every facet of the college experience.







Trevelyan College wins the Global College Award



We are delighted to share that Trevelyan College won the Global College Award at this year's Durham University Global Awards in recognition of our commitment to an inclusive and welcoming environment and development of initiatives to support international students.

At Trevelyan College, we encourage students to 'explore without limits', promoting an environment of inclusivity, support, and respect for all. We embrace and celebrate diversity, embedding global initiatives across our wider student experience. In 2023, the SCR launched the Global Dynamics lecture series, starting with six talks on China's place in the world by world-leading experts from the Universities of Oxford, Warwick, Durham, Naples L'Orientale, London School of Economics, and 3Sixty Strategic Advisors Ltd, London. The JCR hosts monthly language cafés, and international music events, which are open to all. Last year, we launched a weekly conversational English group. In Michaelmas Term, we welcomed over 200 students to our first Global Formal Dinner featuring Middle Eastern, Mediterranean, and Mexicaninspired cuisine, with traditional dress encouraged. We also hosted our first Interfaith Cafés in 2023, including student and staff representatives from across the university, to promote interfaith discussions. Our global activities have significant impact, supporting our aspirations as a respectful, inclusive, and interdisciplinary community of students, staff, and local community members. In October 2023, Trevelyan College launched the **Explore Programme, which provides student enrichment** and wellbeing opportunities for undergraduate and postgraduate students at Trevs. The Explore Programme aims to enable our students to develop new skills, gain new experiences, and explore new interests, aligned with the College's tagline - explore without limits. All Explore Programme activities are free and open to all Trevelyan College students, promoting an environment of support, inclusion, and curiosity.

In the first year, we have trialled a wide range of enrichment and wellbeing activities, and it has been great to see high levels of engagement from the student community. We have also integrated some existing initiatives into the Explore Programme to ensure coordination and increased awareness of the opportunities on offer. Explore Programme initiatives complement the wide range of student-led activities organised by the JCR and MCR, and often involve collaboration between student leaders and college staff. As the programme develops, we hope to include additional opportunities for our alumni to engage in and contribute to our Explore Programme activities.

In October, we welcomed Professor Donna Chambers (Northumbria University) to present our Black History Month Explore Lecture on 'All God's children need travelling shoes: critical reflections on race, gender, identity and belonging', followed by dinner with students to continue the discussion. We also hosted an information session for postgraduate research students on The Brilliant Club Scholars Programme. which provides opportunities for PhD students to deliver sessions in local schools. Our first Explore Wellbeing activity was a popular dog wellbeing session, with two beagles, Odin and Zeus, visiting the College and spending time with students for relaxation.

In November, we hosted a careers-related session with alumna Claire Wilkinson on 'Exploring City careers', our first photography competition on 'Explore Autumn', and a writing retreat for finalists and postgraduates. Our Hill Colleges Chaplain, Rebecca, hosted the first 'Tea and Talk' session, which is an informal group support session for students with light refreshments in E Meeting Room. Rebecca also organised our first interfaith café, with students and staff from across the university joining us for lunch and conversation. Odin and Zeus returned for a second dog wellbeing session in November, following the popular first session earlier in the term.

Before the Christmas vacation, students engaged in a range of volunteering and community engagement activities, including our Christmas Wish Tree to collect food and other essential items for local community members, the Christmas Cards for Care Homes scheme, and Christmas craft sessions.

In January, we organised a second photography competition with the theme of 'Explore Durham', with a wide range of images submitted of locations across the city. Other activities included finalist study sessions, a poetry workshop, Tea and Talk sessions, and a dog wellbeing session.

In February, we welcomed Dr Craig Griffiths (Manchester Metropolitan University) to present our LGBTQ+ History Month Explore Lecture on 'Queer History, Social Justice, and Human Rights Language'. Following the lecture, students were invited to join the speaker for dinner and continue the conversation on the key themes explored within the talk.

In February and March, our programme of Explore Wellbeing activities expanded. In addition to a dog wellbeing session, students joined Explore Yoga, Explore SoundBath, Explore Glow Dance, and Explore Box HIIT classes. These proactive wellbeing initiatives were popular new initiatives with both undergraduate and postgraduate students alike.

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We hosted our first PGR lunches in Epiphany Term, which provided an opportunity for our postgraduate research students to meet over lunch on High Table and to discuss their research with the College Officers. We have greatly enjoyed the opportunity to hear more about the breadth of research undertaken by our postgraduate community. During Global Week, we were delighted to host a Global Interfaith Lunch in collaboration with the Durham Interfaith Student Network and Durham University Chaplaincy Network. Following lunch, students and staff enjoyed a game of a global interfaith jenga to promote interfaith conversation.

In Epiphany Term, we launched our first poetry competition on 'Explore Community'. Entries were judged by a panel, including members of the Senior Common Room. The judges were extremely impressed by the quality of submissions to the competition, which reflected various aspects of the theme. The winning entries of the competition are published within this edition of Hippocampus – congratulations to the prize winners!

Students enjoyed additional proactive wellbeing sessions in Easter Term, including Body Weight Circuits, and Glutes and Abs, as part of the Explore Wellbeing and Stress Less activities organised during the revision and examination periods. In addition, we organised weekly Cake in the Quad and two visits from an ice cream van as opportunities to take a break from their studies. We also hosted a petting zoo, which proved incredibly popular with students, and the College staff!

Our final creative competition of the year was the Julian Trevelyan Art Prize, which this year accepted submissions on any theme and in any medium. Students were able to vote for their preferred entry for the highly commended prize, with the winning entry chosen by a panel. Students are able to access free art materials in the Upper JCR, and we hope to expand our range of visual art activities next academic year.

Our final Explore Programme activity of the academic year will be the college beach clean on the Durham coastline in June. Our annual beach clean is an important opportunity for students to explore the local area, as well as learn about important environmental concerns. More information about our local environmental initiatives can be found in this edition of Hippocampus.

In our first year, we have hosted over 50 Explore Programme activities. We would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has taken part in the first year of the programme either as a participant, supporter or organiser. We are already planning our activities for the next academic year and if you have any ideas of suggestions, we would be delighted to hear from you.

The Explore Fund

The Explore Fund provides support to current undergraduate and postgraduate students at Trevelyan College to participate in personal development and student enrichment activities beyond their academic studies.

British Rowing Student Development Programme

Through the support of the Explore Fund I was selected and able to become a part of British Rowing's Student Development Programme, part of the British Rowing Olympic Pathway, a programme designed to support students rowing at university, in my case having learnt at university, to prepare for GB U23 Trials and beyond.

One of the manifestations of this was a week-long sculling camp held at the National Water Sport Centre. The experience started with a great degree of uncertainty, arriving in Nottingham alone with no boat, a duffle bag, and weeks of physical preparation. Within two hours of arriving, we were briefed and out on the water for our first assessment. Within three hours of arriving at the camp, I had capsized three times and started to question whether I was here to row or to swim. After this we were given our first rest of the day, 30 minutes to shower and change before a round of erg testing, it was as tiring as it sounds. The ergs were short, only 250m rate 40-44 and 1k rate 24, as 2k test predictors, but gruelling nonetheless.

The following days followed a fairly similar pattern, 6.15 wake up, 6.30 briefing, 6.45 on the water for a UT2 paddle (low intensity higher mileage) followed by a shower and breakfast at 8.30. After breakfast would be a lecture to give us some time to digest food, such as a health and hygiene lecture, centring around maintaining health and avoiding infection from water based hazards. The lecture would be followed by a higher intensity racing piece and then lunch. After lunch at around 2 o'clock we would have an hour of one-on-one video review and then have an hour and a half tech centred UT2 to apply what we had learned, followed by a short erg, and then dinner.

The final day saw us pitted against each other in a time trial and some side by side racing, mainly in singles (as this was the focus of the camp) but with the addition of some crew boats such as quads and doubles. Within the side by side racing, I managed to win my side by side heat, and side by side quad racing, however unfortunately lost in the double after my crewmate caught a colossal crab, better described as a lobster. The final results displayed a significant improvement in a very short period of time over the camp.

Rowing is a sport which is exceptionally difficult and I aspire to take as far as I physically can with the hope of trialling in 2024 for the U23 squad in November. I would like to thank Trevelyan College and the Explore Fund for its ongoing support.

Transitioning from Rowing to Weightlifting: A Personal **Enrichment Journey**

In the final year at university, I decided to participate in a transformative personal enrichment project: transitioning from competitive rowing to competitive weightlifting. Having enjoyed considerable success as a member of the GB U23 Rowing team, resulting in selection for the World Rowing Championships in Plovdiv, Bulgaria, and winning the European Championships in Krefeld, Germany, I found myself at a crossroads upon aging out of the U23 category. Recognizing the need for a new challenge. I decided to attempt to apply my high-performance athlete experience to a different sport as I took up Olympic Weightlifting.

I began training in October, however my first competition occurred in January where I competed at 'Durham University Lifting Club Winter Open' in the F71 category. This was a brilliant experience unlike anything I had done before. I managed to snatch 59 kg and a clean and jerk 71 kg, giving me a total of 130 kg, thereby securing qualification for the British University Weightlifting Championships.



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Participating in BUCS proved to be a profoundly enriching experience, as I found myself pitted against esteemed competitors, including an Olympian amongst other national-level athletes. Beyond the accolades and achievements, this journey has been marked by invaluable lessons and personal growth.

I would like to express my appreciation to Trevelyan College for their generous financial contribution, which facilitated access to essential resources such as gym memberships, coaching, and travel expenses associated with this endeavour. Their support has been instrumental in enabling me to pursue my passion, and develop my independence, resilience, and determination. Weightlifting has given me structure during a high-pressure academic year, and facilitated my mental and physical wellbeing.

Music Masterclasses

From my first concert at Trevelyan College in my first year to singing in the Chapter House of Durham Cathedral and the Glasshouse International Centre for Music with Durham University Chamber Choir in my third year, singing has been a massive part of my undergraduate life. I have immersed myself in music inside and outside of my degree. I have also worked with an outreach programme, Samling Futures, and visited local schools in County Durham.

The Explore Fund was instrumental in allowing me to receive intensive rehearsals with my accompanist and masterclasses outside of my singing lessons. The coaching I received allowed me to perform with more confidence and engaging stage presence. I gained a deeper understanding of the music and the ability to connect with the audience on a new level. The opportunity to meet world-class singers who shared their career advice and discussed their professional journeys was also incredibly inspiring. It reminded me that pursuing a career as a professional musician is entirely possible. I am extremely grateful to the Explore Fund for giving me this opportunity.

This initiative not only helped me enhance my competitive skills but also allowed me to engage with a broader community of cue sports enthusiasts.

Receiving this funding enabled me to cover the entry fees, accommodation and travel expenses associated with the tournaments. Snooker and pool, while often lumped together, test different sets of skills and strategies, offering unique challenges and learning opportunities. As vice president of the University Cue Sports Society and a first team player for 2 years, my attendance at tournaments was vital.

The snooker tournament was an excellent experience. Held at Tamworth Snooker Club, the event drew university teams from across the UK, providing a platform to measure my skills against the best university players. The tournament entailed an individual trophy and a team trophy, allowing for lots of play time for everyone.

Shortly after the snooker tournament, I participated in the BUCS league pool tournament, which took place across 3 pool venues around Stoke and Newcastle-Under-Lyme. This event is the biggest on the university Cue Sports calendar with the team championship being the most coveted prize.

In my past 2 years attending with the university B team (2022) and subsequently A team (2023), we have been knocked out in the last 16. The last Durham team to win the BUCS championship was over 20 years ago so it was a tall order for the 5-man A team going for the trophy this year. The team were playing as well as we'd all ever played, and the final vs Keele was a comfortable 6-1 victory to bring Durham the BUCS championship title.

The Explore Fund has enabled me to significantly improve my skills under pressure in both snooker and pool, whilst playing a major role in the winning of Durham's first BUCS trophy in the sport for over 20 years. This has laid a strong foundation for the society, and I look forward to going to defend the title next year.

The Allotment table - Matthea Erasmus


I never liked the water trough

Global Dynamics

In 2023, the Senior Common Room launched the Global Dynamics lecture series, starting with six talks on China's place in the world by world-leading experts from the Universities of Oxford, Warwick, Durham, Naples 'L'Orientale', London School of Economics, and 3Sixty Strategic Advisors Ltd, London. Global Dynamics explores topics of international significance across the four faculties and provides a key opportunity for our students, staff and SCR members to engage in interdisciplinary discussion with leading authorities on changing global dynamics.

The lectures are free and open to all, and we are delighted to welcome participants from across the University and local community to join us. Each lecture is followed by dinner with the speaker, with complimentary places available for students, to promote further discussion. We hope to be able to make next year's lectures, which will focus on electoral politics, available online to facilitate participation from our alumni community. An overview of the lectures from the Academic Year 2023/2024 can be found below:

Why China? Putting China's resurgence in context (Professor Anoush Ehteshami, Durham University)

We began the Trevelyan College Global Dynamics Lecture Series by asking the question 'why China?'. Professor Ehteshami explained the global significance of China's return to the centre of the international system. He looked at the reasons for China's resurgence and the geoeconomic and geopolitical implications of the country becoming the second largest economy on the planet and the United States' nearpeer power this century.

China as a civilisational power (Professor Vivienne Shue, **University of Oxford)**

With her deep knowledge of China and its history, Professor Shue is best placed to discuss why China is in many ways a unique power. Professor Shue provided her own expert overview of China's modern history, as she examined some of the key relevant events and episodes (over the last 100 years or so of China's own political history) which she believes have helped shape political perspectives in Beijing today, answering why they want (or feel they need) to advance their own narratives about civilisations, civilisational power, and global order.

China's worldview: the international system from China's perspective (Professor Shaun Breslin, University

In this lecture, one of the country's foremost authorities on China's international relations, Professor Shaun Breslin, explored how China views the current international system, its policy priorities, the forces that shape Beijing's worldview, and the key drivers of China's policies in Asia and beyond.

China's Belt and Road Initiative (Mr Ali Borhani, 3Sixty Strategic Advisors Ltd, London)

Mr Borhani brought a business perspective to the forum in reflecting on one of China's most talked about economic and foreign policy priorities, notably the vaunted Belt and Road Initiative, which since 2013 has been creating a dense web of connectivities across Eurasia and Africa, and is now also reaching the shores of South America. In assessing the importance of the BRI, Mr Borhani discussed the origins of the BRI in Chinese strategic thinking, its goals and achievements thus far, and its future.

PRC-US relations in a new world order (Professor Michael Cox, London School of Economics)

For both the United States and China, the biggest strategic issue of concern is not Russia or another war in the European theatre, but the creeping tensions in their own bilateral relations. Observers will have noted bilateral relations worsen under President Trump and also the covid-19 pandemic, but there are deep structural roots to this and Professor Cox discussed what the sources of tensions might be and also how each party views the other and the emerging global order.

PRC-European relations in the Xi Jinping era (Dr Enrico Fardella, University of Naples 'L'Orientale' and Director of **ChinaMed Project)**

We ended this year's lecture series with a sharp focus on Sino-European relations. Dr Fardella discussed China's reasons for cooperation and collaboration with Europe and the place of Europe in China's global vision. He explored the significance of China for European economies and the evolution of China's policies with regard to Eurasia in the era of China's current president and CC Party leader, Xi Jinping.

Welcome and Orientation Week

We plan early on from the term before the summer, including working with the JCR executive members in planning their specified events such as the Freshers' Bop, International Freshers' Week, and also hold interviews for general Freps that help us make all these events happen in September.

With all our proceeds going to Nordoff & Robbins and generous donations from guests, we were able to raise a total of £1730 for the organisation.

These short talks, each around 10 minutes long, encourage the development of public speaking and communication skills to a non-specialist audience in a friendly, relaxed environment.

We have had a whole range of exciting and thought provoking talks this year.

During Freshers' Week, members of the Frep Team introduced new students to life in Durham with talks on places to visit in the North East and a guide to studying in Durham cafés, as well as a topical talk in the wake of Liz Truss's mini budget on the possibilities and difficulties in reforming British Constitution. In Michaelmas Term, we travelled back in time through the history of Durham via five city locations, and heard about 2020 Leighton Buzzard earthquakes. During Epiphany Term, our series celebrated LGBTQ+ History Month with a talk on LGBTQ+ pioneers in medicine, as well as other talks on trickers in folklore and climate refugees.

This year's series of talks culminated in our Dissertation Open Mic Night, where finalists spoke about their research, with talks on the decline of the British Aristocracy during the twentieth century, and the legal process behind extradition. 
