Aims:	<p>To enable students to gain fluency in Hebrew through reading selected passages from the biblical text.</p> <p>To enable students to develop further their skills in biblical Hebrew with respect to the translation and exegesis of these passages.</p> <p>To enable students to engage with up-to-date Hebrew Bible scholarship on the relevant texts.</p> <p>To consider, among other things, matters of history, literary analysis, background and theology.</p>
Content:	<p>Consolidation and extension of previous Biblical Hebrew language learning with a focus on syntax.</p> <p>Comprehension of Biblical Hebrew texts of intermediate difficulty (e.g., from Deuteronomy; Joshua; 1–2 Kings; Jonah).</p> <p>Introduction to textual criticism, semantic analysis, and syntactic analysis beyond the level of clauses.</p> <p>Introduction to intermediate Biblical Hebrew reference grammars (e.g., B. T. Arnold and J. H. Choi; C.H.J. van der Merwe, J. A. Naudé and J. H. Kroeze).</p> <p>Discussion of exegetical and theological issues that the language of the chosen texts raises.</p>
