
- Mastering a discipline


Structure of MA in Global History

- Core Module: 30 credits (Foundations of Global History)
- Dissertation: 60 credits (10,000 words)
- Optional Modules: 30 credits each
 - Additional skills or language modules available
- Total Credits = 180



Structure of MA in History

- Core Module: 30 credits (Themes, Readings, Sources)
- **Dissertation**: 60 or 90 credits (15,000 or 20,000 words)
- Optional Modules: 30 credits each
 - Two or three of these, depending on dissertation
 - Those taking three optional modules are encouraged to include a skills module in their selection (eg, a 30credit language module)
- Total Credits = 180



Structure of MA in Social and Economic History

- Similar to MA in History at 180 credits in total, but with some particular requirements
- 120 credits from modules within the History Department: Core Module (TRS), one Optional Module, and 60-credit Dissertation
- Remaining 60 credits through specific modules in other Departments – see Regulations

- Optional Modules
- Continuing to develop dissertation and pursue research
- Core Module Conference
- Producing dissertation by August...but get going before!





Core Modules: Themes, Readings, Sources and Foundations of Global History

Academic staff: (Module Leader) and specialist History Department staff

Introduction to development of discipline, historiographic debate, and source analysis within the relevant field

Formative essay, i.e. dissertation proposal (2,000 words)

Assessment 1: Essay (4,000 words)

Assessment 2: Oral Presentation at MA Conference



Optional Modules

- Some Optional Modules run over two terms; some only in Term 1 or Term 2; all are seminar based
- Language and Skills classes are part of the Optional portfolio:
 - Ancient and Modern
 - Palaeography
 - Class-based
 - Languages tend to be taught across Terms 1, 2 and 3, and assessed by examination and/or portfolio, but check current module regulations

Dissertation

- 60 or 90 credits (10,000, 15,000 or 20,000 words)
- Dissertation supervisor: you need to work closely together; please check MA Handbook for respective duties of supervisors and supervisees
- Project planning and logistics crucial!
