UUK International: Benefits of a Year Abroad

6.6% of UK undergraduates study, work or volunteer overseas during their degree (33% are language students).

Compares to USA - 15%, Germany - 25%

If you spend time Abroad as a student, you are:

- 19% more likely to get a 1st class degree;
- 20% less likely to be unemployed;
- and will earn 5% more within 6 months of graduation.



GLOBAL CITIZENS

- Global challenges are largely outside the Anglosphere
- The Global economy spans more than the Anglosphere
- Limits the communicative effectiveness of English Mother tongue speakers in international business and international relations

[...] it must be a key interest of [...] Universities to form rounded student personalities and to graduate future mediators between cultures in a globalised world. For this purpose each additional language that they speak, or at least understand, will be an asset

- An ability to work collaboratively with teams of people from a range of backgrounds and countries
- Excellent communication skills: both speaking and listening
- A high degree of drive and resilience
- An ability to embrace multiple perspectives and challenge thinking
- A capacity to develop new skills and behaviours according to role requirements
- A high degree of self-awareness
- An ability to negotiate and influence clients across the globe from different cultures

- Improve prospects for international mobility and work overseas
- Improve inter-cultural communication and cultural awareness
- Employers recognise the value of a period of study or work abroad

- 77% of pages on the Internet are in a language other than English
- 54% of adults in the European Union use two or more languages at work <u>every day</u>
- 80% of world trade is conducted in a language other than English
