



Curriculum overview

MY LIBRARY.



L1 – 6 broad-based lecturetutorial modules across all genres and periods. Exams. L2 – Shakespeare, Theory, seminar option, period-based lecture-tutorial modules. Mixed assessment –exams and essays L3 – Independent dissertation, research-based seminar options, lecture-tutorial modules. Choice; mostly coursework.

Single Hons: Up to 2 modules in other departments at L1; 2 at L2-L3 combined. Pre-1800 rule.



Teaching

- All modules are year-long
- Lecture-tutorial modules L1-L3: lectures, plus tutorials of 8, formative essays and 1-to-1 feedback sessions
- Seminar modules L2 and L3 (groups up to 20) specialist topics – assessed by essays
- Compulsory L2 modules: Shakespeare, The Theory and Practice of Literary Criticism
- Compulsory dissertation in L3: a double-weighted, individually designed, supervised, independent research project
- Wide range of module-choice at L2 and L3
- Assessment moves from mainly exam at L1 to mainly coursework (essays / dissertation) at L3
