- Undergraduate degrees are three years (four in Scotland)







Durham


- Two supportive communities: department and college

Dissertation topics are chosen and started in second year (third year in Scotland)


Dissertations involve training and original research under expert supervisors


Usually 10,000-12,000 words

Entry requirements

A level - AAB.

BTEC Level 3 National Extended Diploma/OCR Cambridge Technical Extended Diploma - DDD.

International Baccalaureate score - 36 to include 665 in higher level subjects.
