Getting Started

Here we will cover some of the basics you might want to think about early on in your housing journey: Affordability, Location, and Housemates.

Affordability

Budget - A great starting point, when thinking about your housing options, is to work out how much rent you want to pay. This will help with your searches and it will also give you an idea of the overall cost of renting - not all tenancies include bills in the rent.

Location

Most student accommodation in Durham is within either walking distance or a short bus/cycle ride from the city centre and main University sites.

Thinking about where your College is, and where your teaching buildings are going to be is a good start when considering where to search for housing. You might also want to think about:

- other University spaces you might frequently use (e.g. Library, Sports & Wellbeing Park, student theatre/music practice/performance spaces, boathouse etc);
- any specific community spaces you might want easy access to such as prayer spaces, local GP services, swimming pool etc;
- proximity to public transport how close do you want to be to the bus or train station and connecting services?

The City has six different areas, each with their own character, where you'll find a good amount of student accommodation. They are known as Peninsula, Claypath, Viaduct, Elvet, Gilesgate and Neville's Cross (you can view a map of these here).

You can find plenty of student opinions on these areas with a quick search online, and your College will also offer Housing Talks in Michaelmas term to share their own experiences of 'living-out' in Durham. International Students can also access a specific guide through the International Students Association, updated in 2025 (see Useful Links).

You'll also find some student accommodation in suburbs and towns outside the city, but still accessible to the University. To the north we have students living in Aykley Heads, Framwellgate Moor, Pity Me and Newton Hall. To the east we have students living in Belmont and Carrville. To the west we have students living in Langley Moor, Meadowfield and Brandon. To the south we have students living in Shincliffe and Bowburn.

Importantly (no matter what you might read), there is NO 'party area' in Durham. There are many pubs, clubs, bars and social spaces, as well as community, arts and cultural events happening throughout the year in our vibrant city. You'll also have College events and University social spaces to attend throughout your time here. We recommend prioritising your search for a home on a space you can live comfortably in, study well in and relax in.

Want to know how many other students live where you're looking? This map from April 2025 will give you an idea of this - the darker the shading, the higher the percentage of students in the postcode.

Thinking about safety in the city? This handy <u>NIGHT LIGHTS</u> map shows the lit walking routes through the city at night and <u>Durham Constabulary</u> provides local policing information, including crime statistics.

Housemates

Whether you've taken up the option for us to connect you with other house hunters in your College, or you are conducting your own search here's some handy information about housemates.

Finding housemates is a common student experience so there is plenty of guidance out there. Although many of the guides relate to the experience of undergraduates searching for second year housemates, the following advice is a good starting place:

(n.b. Student Roost, Student Cribs and Prestige Student Living are all private, non-university student accommodation providers – other providers do exist).

Some conversation up front at the outset of your housing journey can help a lot in the long run. As a basic starting point you and your prospective house mates might want to talk about:

- Sleeping Patterns
- Attitudes to Sharing
- Money and how you plan to split and pay for shared bills
- Sociability
- Interests
- Cleanliness

Searching, Securing and Settling In

Here we provide a variety of information to help you with your search for a home, signposting for when you are signing up to a tenancy and a little to get you started on settling in at Durham.

Searching

Getting started

There is a **Code of Practice for Student Lettings** in Durham and we encourage you to read this. Many letting agents and landlords, as well as almost every Purpose Built Student Accommodation Provider operating in Durham, have signed up to the Code, which supports students searching for a private rented home in Durham. You can find the Code here along with a list of the members, and links to get in touch with them.



Remember that your College may also have information available for you – we encourage you to reach out to the Welfare Team and/or Livers Out 'Rep' if your College has one.

<u>Durham Uni Find a Housemate | Facebook</u> platform is a great place to find tenancy take-overs, single rooms in larger houses, small groups who want to make a bigger group, or simply to connect with other house hunters. It is operated, monitored and moderated by Durham Students Union.

Specific search engines exist to find 'roommates' such as Spare Room's <u>Find a</u> <u>Roommate</u>, but there can be costs associated with these and you should make your own checks as to what these might be.

StuRents is a third party provided student accommodation search platform: Student Accommodation Durham - Houses, Flats | StuRents. Rightmove is another site you can search for student accommodation in Durham on: Student Accommodation in Durham | Rightmove. Not all landlords / agents use both or either of these platforms so we encourage you to do your own research beyond the signposting here. We have only suggested these to get you started.

Viewings

Always view the accommodation on offer (preferably in person) and consider using this handy <u>Viewing Checklist</u> from Durham Students Union when you view. You can find more information here on <u>what to look for (Save the Student)</u>. If you cannot view a house as a group this advice from <u>The Uni Guide</u> is helpful:

"If you're in a larger group, it might be difficult to find a time to view a property that suits everyone's schedule... it might be that only some of your group can attend a viewing and they'll have to report back. If this is the case, pick someone who'll ask the right questions. Remember to take photos to show those who can't make a viewing."

Signing Up

When you've found 'the one' we can't stress the following guidance strongly enough:

- Always communicate directly with the letting agent or landlord;
- Always read through all the paperwork you are given, especially the tenancy agreement;
- Always ask for clarity on anything you do not understand, or are uncertain about preferably do this in writing, and ask for the response in writing.

A tenancy agreement will be **legally binding** so it is important to understand what you are signing up for. Here are some useful places to read about what to expect at this stage of your housing journey:

Settling In

Planning your move in, don't worry we have some signposting to help with that too!

Household Essentials

You should receive an inventory and clear information from your landlord or agent on what will be in your home when you move in. Once you know what you need to provide don't worry too much about getting it all in advance. Durham has a fantastic local market, many shops and a number of larger retail areas catering for your every need when moving in including:

Food supplies

You needn't worry about bringing too much food with you when you arrive. There are smaller local food shops including Tesco, Sainsbury's, Iceland, Best-One Dunelm Foodstores, Durham Food Store, Anderson's Greengrocers and more in the city centre. We have three Asian grocery shops in Durham: Taste The Orient, Every Day Oriental Food (WLH) and 7 Day Store. There are also two health food shops: Grape Tree and H&B, several food sellers within the Durham Markets, and larger supermarkets Tesco, Sainsbury's, Aldi, Lidl and more just a short bus ride away.

Eating out

Too tired to cook when you arrive or maybe you just want to celebrate arriving in Durham? Large app-based (e.g. Just Eat, Uber Eats, Deliveroo etc) and independent delivery services all operate around the city. We have a large number of cafes, restaurants and take aways near to most student accommodation. You'll mostly always be able to go somewhere local for a bite to eat after unpacking.

Second-hand / New-To-You items

Get a head start with your environmental efforts. Every year during Green Move Out we collect tonnes of items that can be used again from students leaving Durham. Our charity partner <u>County Durham Furniture Help Scheme</u> hosts these items at its warehouse in neighbouring town, Ferryhill.

Budget Travel

Arriva offer travel discounts for students across a large area in and around Durham. You'll need your Durham University ID card but once you have it you can travel from as little as £1.60 a day. Find out more here: Durham University | Bus Routes & Bus Routes & Tickets | Arriva Bus
